Agenda Title: Consider Recommending for Approval by the Board of Directors the 2017 Consumer Confidence Report for the Marina Coast Water District Water System, Central Marina and Ord Community

Staff Recommendation: The Water Conservation Commission recommend approval to the Board of Directors of the 2017 Consumer Confidence Report for the Marina Coast Water District Water System, Central Marina and Ord Community.

Background: 2017 Strategic Plan, Mission Statement – We provide our customers with high quality water, wastewater collection and conservation services at a reasonable cost, through planning, management and the development of water resources in an environmentally sensitive manner.

Discussion/Analysis: The Safe Drinking Water Act requires water utilities to provide accurate and timely information to consumers about the quality of their drinking water. The US Environmental Protection Agency and California State Water Resource Control Board, Division of Drinking Water (formerly known as the California Department of Public Health (CDPH)) adopted regulations known as a Consumer Confidence Report (CCR), to be distributed to water utility customers by July 1st each year. Since 1989, the District has provided CCR's (formerly called annual water quality report) to District customers.

The 2017 CCR summarizes the results of detected contaminants in District's supply wells and distribution systems conducted in calendar year 2017, or for some constituents, the most recent sampling year. The District's water system did not have any violation in 2017 and is in compliance with State and Federal drinking water regulations.

A list of contaminants tested for but not detected will be posted in the District's website at www.mcwd.org/2017cer-ND.html

The 2017 CCR will be mailed together with each customer's water bill starting May 2017. A separate mailing will be conducted for residents in the Ord military housing at or about the same time. Copies will be distributed to Alliance Residential, businesses, apartment managers, and school administrators for further distribution to customers who do not receive a water bill directly from the District. Staff will coordinate with the US Army and CSUMB's News and Public Information Officer to establish the website links for access by the military and university communities. Subject: Review the Current Landscape Incentive Program Description and Develop Recommendations to Improve Participation and Water Savings

Summary: To improve customer participation, improve the MCWD customer experience, and increase the water savings achieved from the District's Landscape Incentive Program, the Commissioners are asked to review the existing landscape incentive program procedures and product eligibility requirements, then develop recommendations for program improvements.

Some details of the existing program were discussed at two WCC working group meetings, conducted in the Spring of 2017 and 2018. At both meetings Commissioners and Staff expressed an opinion that few changes were required to improve participation and water savings, and that the amount of the incentive provided was likely the factor limiting program participation. Most of the existing program procedures and eligibility requirements were not a concern nor a point of discussion. Examples of topics that were discussed but resulted in no suggested changes were the requirement that lawn be replaced with low-water use landscaping (no incentive should be given for simply removing lawn and laying down mulch) and that mulching be required for all planting areas.

At both meetings, the participating Commissioners and staff established an opinion that the incentive provided for lawn replacement would be more attractive to customers if it were increased to as much as \$1.00 per square foot. There were also some discussions about creating different incentives for various customer classifications (Commercial, Industrial, Institutional, Single Family, Multi-family), and perhaps increasing the current maximum incentive payment available to some program participants.

Attached to this report are two documents that describe the current program; the Landscape Incentive Program Description, and the Landscape Incentive Program Details.
