



Please Reduce Your Watering

Experienced gardeners know that as the days shorten, their landscapes water demand is greatly reduced. In our coastal region,



you should reduce your peak June watering duration by 37 percent for

- ✓ Take short showers
- ✓ Wash full loads of laundry
- **✓** Fix leaking faucets and toilets
- ✓ Retrofit to low-flow fixtures
- ✓ Replace lawns and sprinklers
- ✓ Install low water use plants

September, 44 percent for October, and 66 percent for November. Seasonal rains from December through March often

provide all of the water our landscape plants require in those months.

If you use an automatic sprinkler system, water only as needed by using the semi-automatic or manual start feature on your irrigation controller. To eliminate unnecessary watering automatically, install a soil-moisture switch to your existing controller.

Look for the EPA WaterSense Labels

More than half of our interior household water use flows through our bathroom fixtures. When replacing these fixtures with WaterSense labeled high efficiency toilets, showerheads, and faucets, you capture the maximum potential water and energy savings. It is not uncommon to find water and energy savings of \$50 to \$100 or more annually! You can pick up new low-flow showerheads and low-flow faucet aerators at our District offices free of charge. Simple Switches and Sensors Save Money \$\$\$

Rain shut-off switches and soil moisture sensors will automatically turn off your irrigation system during periods of rain or when the soil moisture is adequate for plant growth. Once the weather clears,







your programmed watering events continue. These low cost devices save tremendous amounts of water and have a fast return on investment. Installation is relatively easy and most often can be done without professional help.

Rebates up to \$50 are provided by the District for the installation of these

Residential Hot Water Recirculation System Retrofit Rebate

Rebates Up to \$250

Speed up hot water delivery to your faucets and reduce water waste by modifying your existing hot water lines into a recirculating hot water system. To determine your eligibility for this rebate, we must first meet with you to review the work to be done and to complete a Water Use Survey.

Upgrade to High-Efficiency Toilets

Rebates Up to \$125 per toilet

Replace your old toilets with new, single or dual-flush toilet having a flush volume of 1.28 gallons or less. Manufacturers are now offering a wide selection of these new water-efficient toilets at low cost.

High-Efficiency Clothes Washers

Rebates Up to \$125

Save water, save energy, and save time doing your laundry chores by upgrading to a new, high efficiency clothes washer. All customer categories qualify. Depending on the efficiency of the washer purchased, the District will provide you with a \$50, \$100 or \$125 rebate per machine.

Landscape Incentives

Rebates Up to \$2,000 combined

- Replace lawn with low water-use plantings \$0.25 Cents/Sq. Ft.
- Convert sprinkler zones to drip irrigation \$0.25 Cents/Sq. Ft.
- Retrofit to an approved irrigation timer up to \$1,500
- Install a rain or soil moisture shut-off switch up to \$50
